ANC 6D believes that Capitol Quarter is a fantastic mixed-income community that includes over 300 affordable, workforce and market-rate homes located on nearly 7 city blocks in the Navy Yard neighborhood. DCHA is the owner of nearly 100 homes within this community and has hired Edgewood Management to oversee the day-to-day management of the DCHA-owned units including several designated trash corrals provided for the use of their residents. Unfortunately, due to a variety of factors, the management of trash within the DCHA-owned units at Capitol Quarter has become untenable resulting in unsanitary conditions for all Capitol Quarter residents. These conditions include overflowing trash cans, a significant roach and rodent problem and substantial trash blown into the surrounding public streets. For reference, we have attached photographic evidence demonstrating the scale of this issue. No resident in the District should be forced to live with conditions such as those depicted in these attachments.

These problems, while exacerbated by the COVID-19 crisis, are longstanding and have continued unresolved for years. The root cause is due to a failure by DCHA and Edgewood to address this longstanding problem through proactive management. It is exacerbated by undersized trash corrals that do not provide enough dedicated space to accommodate the Capitol Quarter residents that live in DCHA-owned units. The Capitol Quarter board worked with DCHA for years to resolve this matter, as evidenced by a previous Action Plan from 2018 (attached) developed in conjunction with former ANC 6D07 Commissioner, Meredith Fascett. This letter is a request to DCHA to commit to implementing a durable solution that will address these problems once and for all. These solutions must include both financial and management commitments and have real consequences to DCHA should they not be addressed. Potential solutions include, but should not be limited to, the following:

 Commit to an agreed upon Action Plan (DCHA presented a draft to CQ 1 & 2 BODs on 2/1/21) that includes:

a. Permanently increasing Edgewood's operating budget to allow for proper staffing, vendors, and maintenance.

b. Hiring a 3rd-party contractor to regularly clean DCHA-owned trash corrals.

c. Hiring a 3rd-party contractor to implement a pest control plan that addresses the substantial rodent and roach infestation in the community.

d. Hiring a 3rd-party contractor to provide bulk trash services within the community.

e. Establishing a communication plan to ensure that residents are aware of trash pick-up days and policies, including posting signs in all trash corrals.

f. Installing cameras in all trash corrals to allow DCHA to identify regular violators and properly enforce community policies.

g. Committing to better communication with Capitol Quarter 1 and 2 HOA's to coordinate and tailor solutions.

 Meet with the DC Office of the Attorney General to review and understand DCHA's obligations from the recent settlement as it pertains to Capitol Quarter.

3) Meet with DPW to discuss adding an additional trash pick-up and/or the using larger cans in DCHA corrals.

4) Obtain a commitment from DCHA to hire a 3rd -party contractor for an additional pick-up if the above Action Plan does not resolve these issues or additional pick-ups cannot be arranged through DPW. 5) Assist in establishing a system to fine DCHA should it fail to resolve this matter. (Private landlords would have been fined by the District long-ago for these violations.)

Our hope is that the above action items will resolve this problem once and for all. ANC6D requests a resolution to these concerns within the next 90 days, prior to May 8, 2021.

Capitol Quarter is a gateway to the Navy Yard and a community of which we should all be proud. Our goal in sending this letter is simple – ensure that our community continues to be a welcoming, clean, and safe place for all residents that call it home. We appreciate your support in holding DCHA and its managing agent, Edgewood, accountable to ensure that they uphold their commitments to their residents and neighbors.

At a regularly scheduled and properly noticed public meeting on _____with a quorum being present, a quorum being 4 Commissioners, Advisory Neighborhood Commission (ANC) 6D voted X-X-X for the motion to/in support of _____

ANC 6D is exremely concerned about the conditions of Greenleaf Gardens and what appears to be the lack of proper and consistent up-keep and maintenance of the complex. Our commission is aware of concerns that have been brought up by residents including ones about rodent infestations, mold, water damage, constant leaks, lead, lack of cleaning vents and other housing conditions that are a threat to the health and safety of the reisdents, especially the elderly, those with compromised immune systems and children living in the complex. We are well aware that the property is slighted for redevelopment and that the buildings are at the end of their life span. It appears that more attention is being focused on the redevelopment efforts and not as much critical attention is being placed on making meaningful repairs, air quality monitoring, dedicated maintenance and assuring that those residents who live in units that are not habitable are placed into ones with acceptable housing conditions.

It is our request that you come to our commission in March to provide us with and brief us on the plan for the upkeep and maintenance of Greenleaf, the status of cleaning of the vents/heating systems, dealing with infestation problems in the building and what efforts are being made to get residents moved immediately out of deplorable living conditions. These concerns have been brought to the attention of DCHA many times and our commission is concerned that these detrimental living conditions are having and have contributed to long term health impacts on residents, are exacerbated their existing health conditions and reducing their life expectancy due to consistent exposure to hazardous housing conditions. We would also like to hear the efforts that have been made and are underway to engage and work with Greenleaf residents and who is overseeing the mainteance plan for the complex and that residents have input into the plan.

ANC 6D is concerned about the renovations that were done at 1216 Half Place, SW which has sealed in the back entrance to the home to turn it into a multi unit building. I know that your agency is looking into how this fire hazard for current residents that was created with the renovations made to this home and how it can be corrected. Our commission would like an update on the status of efforts by DC Regulatory Affairs (DCRA) to work with the owner of this residence to make it safe for all of his or her tenants which includes at least one family with children. We have had a few fires in the community during the pandemic and fortunatley with no lives lost. Therefore, we are increasingly concerned about this home that was allowed to be renovated without appearing to meet fire safety codes/standards. We also want to know that since this property appears to have received a special zoning change/adjustment, what is your agency process for working with the owner in cases like this to make sure that these renovations meet and fall within the permit guidleines of DCRA.

In addition, 1234 Half Street, SW is being constructing a full basement in a home that was not built with one. We ask that your agency look into the renovations to that home as well and any other owners on the block that have have applied for permits to make similar renovations to ensure that the construction that they are doing is within their permits and is not creating fire hazards along with the renovations that they are making or planning to do.

This radiation is released around the clock from these sources to the community and we are concerned about the long term health impact that they will have on residents, especially young children, expectant mother, elderly and those with compromised immune systems because of existing health conditions.

It is also requested that the OAG office asked DDOT to place a hold on the permits that AT&T & Verizon have received to install these monopoles until a thurough investigation is performed to ensure the health and safety of these poles, locations for these poles can be identified that will not place them right beside homes and apartments of residents and a reduction is made of the number of poles that are concentrated in the community including around and near our very vulnerable community residents. It is our hope that DDOT will take the concerns of the community about these poles seriously, work with the Department of Energy and Environment to help address the safety concerns and consider the Health & Safety Study (CHASS) that was done by the Department of Health to try encourage safeguards to be implemented and coordination of efforts by the city to help and protect community residents. These monopoles pose a definite threat to the health, safety and well-being of the community. It is our hopes that your office can look into these concerns.

We understand that there have been preliminary talks with DDOT about a Recreational Trails Program grant, as well as with the National Park Service, since portions of the prospective bike trail will ultimately be a part of a new Buzzard Point Park, likely still a long way off. We have several concerns that we believe must be addressed before the new portion of even a "temporary" bike trail is developed.

As the resolution below details, we recommend that a planning grant be obtained first so that DDOT, NPS and the surrounding community can assess both the configuration and dimensions of the trail in relation to the roadway, that the needs of all parties in the immediate vicinity are appropriately addressed, and that responsibilities for maintenance of the new trail, walkways and street are fully accounted for.

WHEREAS, we have not seen a drawing that provides detail sufficient to assess how the trail would accommodate cyclists, pedestrians and preservation of the natural shoreline of the Anacostia River;

WHEREAS, vehicular traffic has increased dramatically since the start of Buzzard Point redevelopment, there is no sidewalk from the east end of V St. proceeding north along Half St., a length of several hundred meters, forcing cyclists, pedestrians and motorists to share a two-lane street;

WHEREAS, there is an especially dangerous choke point at the meeting of V and Half Street SW, with no room in the current configuration to accommodate a bike trail, pedestrian walkway, and roadway, and because of the precipitous dropoff from roadway to shoreline at this point, little additional width to borrow for either bike trail or sidewalk;

WHEREAS, the current schematic runs the bike trail directly in front of the Earth Conservation Corps' bird rehabilitation facility and sanctuary, which is incompatible with the needs of the sanctuary;

WHEREAS, the entire area involved in the project, including the roadway on Half Street, is owned by NPS, and safe passage for all would require both construction of new sidewalks/walkways and complete repaving of the roadway to eliminate the deep potholes that vehicular traffic must now drive around, further pitting pedestrians, cyclists and motorists to compete for a shared space;

WHEREAS, the prospective nonprofit grant recipient and its responsibilities for design and oversight of the project have not been identified, nor have the joint responsibilities of DDOT and NPS for implementation and maintenance of all throughways resulting from this project;

THEREFORE, be it resolved that ANC 6D requests that DDOT entertain a planning grant for this RiverTrail initiative, which would fully develop a design and plan of implementation to safely accommodate cyclists, pedestrians and motorized vehicles, as well as detailed measures to

maintain the natural shoreline of the Anacostia River along the stretch of new trail, and other specifications noted above.

We are also requesting that great weight be applied to ANC6D's recommendation for development of the proposed river trail.
